- 1. The General Fund shows a net gain as of 30th of September, 2022 of \$8,798.90. Grass cutting has been paid up until the end of May, 2022.
- 2. Missions income as at the 30th of September, 2022 totalled \$4,973.53. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. This amount is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$1,719.50; CBOQ Youth \$950.00; CBM General Budget \$1,386.03, Sharing Way \$158.00, and Sharing Way, Ukraine \$760.00.
- 3. The Communion fund had a net loss as of the 30th of September, 2022 of (-\$150.17.) There was a balance in the Communion fund from 2021, leaving a balance of \$160.69 in that fund.
- 4. Donations totalling \$75.00 for Q1 were received for the Sunday School and have been sent to the Treasurer of the Sunday School, Sherry Graham.
- 5. The Future Projects Fund had income in 2022 of \$50.00 from a memorial donation in memory of the late Margaret Helmer, as well as the proceeds from the Easter Sunrise Breakfast of \$65.00, for total income in 2022 of \$115.00. There was a balance in that fund from previous years of \$1,841.00, now giving us a balance of \$1,956.00. There have been no expenses to date in 2022.

Once again, I would like to personally thank the wonderful people of Plains who continue to make sure their donations arrive at my home office, either by mail, drop off, PAR, or etransfer, and/or on the plate at the church. Hope everyone can enjoy the arrival of fall, which brought us cooler weather on the very day it began! Respectfully submitted,

# Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

In the last week and a half Anne and I have been working away at finalizing our plans for Thanksgiving weekend, plans to see family and friends and to enjoy harvest feasts together. We all know that Thanksgiving is not the only time for giving thanks, but it is a wonderful time to be intentional about it. And the harvest coming in gives us good reason to stop and thank God for his provision. So, what are you thankful for as we approach Thanksgiving?

I have noticed that there are the usual answers to that question: family, food, job, home, country.... All of these are good and appropriate things for which to thank God, the giver of every good and perfect gift. But have you ever stopped to consider an "unusual" Thanksgiving list? Let me try to explain what I mean with a story.

Over the course of nine years, I experienced four episodes of a very alarming form of tachycardia (racing heart). The attacks were few and far between but they left me and Anne feeling nervous about travelling or about being with family at places far from medical care. Finally, in 2018 I was scheduled for a procedure to correct the problem and I was *so* relieved and excited!

The week before the procedure I went to the hospital for my pre-op appointment. In the midst of their testing, they noticed something that they (and I) had never noticed before: a hole in my heart. The nurse practitioner explained the situation to me and said that it would probably need to be corrected. She also suggested that I speak to the cardiologist about it the next week when I came in for my procedure.

I drove home from that appointment *very* frustrated and angry! I thought that this life-inhibiting situation was about to be resolved, only to find out that I had ANOTHER big problem to be dealt with sometime, somehow. God and I had words...and not grateful ones.

The following week as I was being prepared for my procedure, the doctor came by, and I asked him about the hole in my heart. He was very dismissive of it and, when I asked again, he said emphatically: "that has nothing to do with what we're doing here today, and I don't want to waste time talking about it." End of discussion. They wheeled me in, and the procedure began.

About hour in it was becoming clear that something wasn't going well. The staff had a quiet discussion at the other end of the room before the doctor came over to me and said: "You know how I said that the hole in your heart had nothing to do with what we're doing today? Well, turns out I was wrong." (Good for him for admitting it). He went on: "we can't access the part of your heart where the problem is by the usual way. But we think if we go into your heart from the other side, go *through* the hole in your heart, we'll have direct access to the problem."

They rejigged my set-up, did what they proposed and voila! A successful procedure (and no racing heart since).

Why the story? Because, while I was angry at first (it sure seemed like things were getting worse), I was suddenly very grateful to have a hole in my heart! And it turns out that it's a completely benign hole that needs no repair. Was God giving me a good gift? Yes! Did I realize it at first? NO! Do I give thanks for the hole in my heart today? You bet I do.

So, here's my question: what is your unusual note of thanks to God this Thanksgiving? What is something that no one would expect you to be grateful for, but that God has used for good in your life?
