

With hands on Pastor Phil Butler, Margaret Bell and the Deacons prayed for him and his wife Anne, as they move on in their work with God.

On Sunday, September 10 Pastor Phil Butler preached his last sermon at Plains as Interim Pastor while the congregation searched for a full-time Pastor following the retirement of Pastor Margaret Bell in May of 2022. At his request of no gifts, a donation was be made to Helping Hands on his behalf. Helping Hands is a non-profit food distribution centre dedicated to rescuing food from bakers, growers and retailers for re-distribution to organizations, agencies and missions.

A floral arrangement was presented, and a commemorative cake was enjoyed by everyone in Oak Hall following the service.

On Sunday, September 17 the Guest Speaker was Jim Collins, Co-founder and Executive Director of Harvest Hands (food re-distribution ministry). When asked how he explained the quick and vast growth of this project which operates solely on donations and volunteers, his reply was "It's God's work. There is no other explanation".



HARVEST HANDS started by knocking on the doors of growers and manufacturers three years ago by Jim and Jacinthia Collins, and they immediately found dozens of businesses and people willing to donate surplus and unsellable food products. All of the food they redistribute is donated, as is all the labour, including the truck drivers – individuals who drive their own vehicles to both pick up and deliver boxes and palettes of food.

HARVEST HANDS is a non-profit food distribution centre dedicated to 'rescuing' food from bakers to retailers to help agencies and thousands of families throughout

SW Ontario. Funded entirely by donations and volunteer-driven, **HARVEST HANDS** provides food to over 160+ organizations, agencies and missions, who in turn, feed over 52,000 meals per month, including individuals and families seeking food.

Jim Collins is a businessman who founded Harvest Hands to rescue thousands of dollars of surplus food to help families and agencies with safe and nutritious meals for a hand-up to a healthier future, partnering with agencies to make a difference in lives.

Our network is comprised of more than 160+ agencies across SW Ontario including food banks, pantries, soup kitchens, missions, emergency shelters, residences, seniors' residences, community housing and other programs. We are motivated to demonstrate God's love through acts of kindness and are committed to meeting the needs of the most vulnerable in our region.

HOW DOES HARVEST HANDS WORK:

Food is donated by bakers, growers and retailers.

Suppliers contact us when they have a surplus.

We pick up at the supplier's warehouse.

We bring all food back to our warehouse for sorting and quality control.

We provide food to 160+ agencies in 14 counties across South Western Ontario.

OUR VISION

In the process of eliminating hunger for those most vulnerable, our vision is to seek practical means to equip individuals and families with skills for independent living. This includes training on education and employment, financial management and other aspects of healthy living.

- 1. The General Fund shows a net gain as of 30th of September, 2023 of \$15,249.88.
- 2. Missions income as at the 30th of September 2023 totalled \$4,973.53. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. This amount is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$1,392.50; CBOQ Youth 1,775.00; CBM General Budget \$682.03; CBM Sharing Way \$164.00; Sharing Way Ukraine \$340.00; Sharing Way Turkey \$520.00, & Turkey & Syria Foodgrains Bank \$100.00.
- 3. The Communion fund had a net gain as of 30th of September, 2023 of \$921.84.

 There was a balance from previous years of \$310.86, giving a total of \$1,232.70 in the Communion Fund.
- 4. Donations totalling \$10.00 have been received for the Sunday School. That amount has been paid to the Sunday School Treasurer, Sherry Graham at the end of the 3rd quarter.
- 5. Special Projects Fund --Carried forward from 2022 \$3,119.00; Memorial Funds in 2023 \$20.00; Other Donations in 2023 \$100.00, Centre Street Baptist funds for Electronic Sign \$24,558.00, and Centre Street Baptist Funds for Tables and Chairs \$6,659, for a total of \$34,456.

Rob is the youngest of the siblings. On 11 OCT 1997 Rob married Melissa and on 8 OCT 2008, Rob and Melissa had their daughter, Olivia.

Rob graduated from East Elgin Secondary School in Aylmer, Ontario in 1990. He attended the University of Guelph for about a year and half in pursuit of a B.Sc. in physics. When that didn't work out, he enrolled at Seneca College of Applied Arts and Technology and graduated with a diploma in Electronics Engineering Technology (Communication) in 1996.

Rob worked as a Technical Writer and Quality Assurance Manager for TouchLink Communications Inc.

After TouchLink, he worked for Anritsu Electronics Inc. as a Technical Sales Support person until he was laid off.

Rob then entered ministry work on a more intentional basis, first as a Christian Education Director and later as an Associate Pastor while in seminary. Rob attended Acadia Divinity College in Wolfville, NS from 2003-2006 where he acquired his Bachelor of Theology. While there, he was employed as the Associate Pastor of Youth and Family ministries at Woodville and Billtown United Baptist Churches. After graduation, he returned to Ontario where he was employed as Pastor of West Oro Baptist Church from AUG 2006 - SEP 2015. In OCT 2015 Rob and his family moved to Arkona, where he began as Pastor of Arkona Baptist Church, 1 NOV 2015.

Rob has about 20 years of ministry experience in different contexts starting as a Sunday School teacher when he was a teen, and later he volunteered as a youth leader. In 2002-03 he was employed as the Christian Education Director at Bethany Baptist Church in Ottawa and worked primarily with the youth and children. His other experience in pastoral roles is briefly outlined above.

Rob enrolled with the military 17 DEC 2018 as chaplain to the members of HMCS PREVOST in London, ON.. Since his enrolment he has endeavoured to provide a ministry of presence to the crew and to form relationships that will be beneficial in future situations.
