

This amount is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$1,852.50; CBOQ Youth 1,975.00; CBM General Budget \$920.70; CBM Sharing Way \$184.00; Sharing Way Ukraine \$340.00; Sharing Way Turkey \$520.00, & Turkey & Syria Foodgrains Bank \$100.00.
  Included in the \$1.852.50 to CBOQ General Budget was a \$200 donation to honour our anniversary guest speaker.
  - Included in the \$1,852.50 to CBOQ General Budget was a \$200 donation to honour our anniversary guest speaker, the Rev. Leanne Friesen, Executive Minister with CBOQ.
- 3. The Communion fund had a net gain as of 31st of October, 2023 of \$815.15.

  There was a balance from previous years of \$751.87, giving a total of \$1,567.02 in the Communion Fund.
- 4. Donations totalling \$20.00 have been received for the Sunday School. The balance will be paid to the Sunday School Treasurer, Sherry Graham at the end of the 4th quarter.
- 5. Special Projects Fund --Carried forward from 2022 \$3,119.00; Memorial Funds in 2023 \$490.00; Other Donations in 2023 \$100.00, Centre Street Baptist funds for Electronic Sign \$24,558.00, and Centre Street Baptist Funds for Tables and Chairs \$6,659, for a total of \$34,926.34. Expenses in 2023 totaled \$31,217.34, leaving a balace of \$3,709.00 in the Special Projects Fund.

If you are working on something that you really care about, you don't have to be pushed.

As we leave October and move into November our thoughts move from Thanksgiving to Remembrance, or at least mine do. Remembrance Day has always played an important part of my life from an early age. Perhaps it was because I know my maternal grampa, Robert Hall Dobbie (Robin), served as a corporal or bombardier in the Royal Artillery during WW1, it certainly had more impact when I grew older and had seen historical depictions of the battle fields.

Then as a teenager I joined Royal Canadian Air Cadet 741 Elgin Squadron and started parading at ceremonies every year in Port Burwell, Springfield and Aylmer. That brought new meaning and significance. Now, of course, I am a serving member of the Canadian Armed Forces so that brings even more meaning and feelings. Now, I know living people who are serving in dangerous places and in dangerous situations. I have talked with sailors and soldiers who have endured conflicts in Afghanistan and other theatres of operation. I see news stories about our ships being shadowed by Chinese ships and worry about the chaplain friends I know serving aboard.

Maybe you feel that the church shouldn't recognize or have Remembrance Day type ceremonies? That's ok. But I think it is very appropriate that we remember all those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in the services. "No one has greater love than this: to lay down his life for his friends," says Jesus in John 15:13. We don't like war or violence and would always seek peace first but sometimes there is no alternative. Some might argue that there is always a choice, maybe, but I am not sure. In the 2011 film "Captain America: The First Avenger," there is a scene where Steve Rogers (Cpt America) is asked by the German doctor doing his medical exam, "Do you want to kill Nazis?" Steve replies, "I don't want to kill anyone. I don't like bullies; I don't care where they're from." I think many veterans would agree.

Jesus, knows self-sacrifice. He knows what is means to put others ahead of self. That is why he came. To do battle. To fight for our lives. Jesus laid down his life for the sinners of the world. So that's everyone. He died so we could have life, abundant life. It's fitting that often Remembrance Sunday corresponds with Communion Sunday for us Baptists. Not only do we remember veterans of our earthly wars and conflicts but we remember Christ's sacrifice, the greatest example of love.

So yes, we move from Thanksgiving to Remembrance as we transition from October to November, but really, we don't, because in remembering we are also giving thanks in recognizing what others have done for us. May we use these times of remembrance to learn and grow in our understanding of what it means to love others... even our enemies... with all our hearts, souls, minds and strengths.

Lest we forget!
