- 1. The General Fund shows a net loss as of 31st of January, 2024 of (-\$320.90.)

 Monies from previous years in the General Fund total \$82,406.00, leaving us a net gain of \$82,085.10.
- 2. Missions income as at the 31 of January, 2024 totalled \$439.67. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. This amount is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$75.00; CBOQ Youth \$200.00; CBM General Budget \$146.67; and CBM Sharing Way \$18.00.
- 3. The Communion fund had a net gain as of 31st of January, 2024 of \$238.34.

 There was a balance from previous years of \$1,412.33, giving a total of \$1,650.67 in the Communion Fund.
- 4. Special Projects Fund has a balance of \$4,755.50 for future projects.

Thank you to all the Plains Family who continue to help this church on the corner of the Oak Plains remain a thriving community of believers, spreading God's word to all.

The service is just the beginning of what I hope will be a long and blessed ministry together.

Love. We enter into this month and one of the images that often comes to mind is that of hearts and cupids as we look toward the 14th and Valentine's Day. I'm pretty sure it's not everyone's favourite Hallmark holiday but it can be fun. I remember as an elementary school boy giving out little paper cards to all the girls, sometimes with little candy hearts attached. It's supposed to be about love.

The 1984 Foreigner hit song "I Want to Know What Love Is," brings us the following lyrics:

I wanna know what love is, I want you to show me I wanna feel what love is, I know you can show me (hey)

Though this and so many other songs are about romantic love (eros in Greek), it seems we humans all need to know what it is to love and be loved. I know that there have been studies on infants and children that tell us that we are healthier when we feel loved. But I am not sure the world needs more romantic love. No, as I look at the news and the world I see a need for a different love, a familial love (phileo in Greek). A love that recognizes each other as siblings with more in common than we are different. With so much violence, distrust, dissension and even hatred out there what we need is to learn to love each other. We need to start looking at each other and see ourselves in others. One of my new favourite Elvis Presley songs is called "Walk a Mile in My Shoes." It states:



If I could be you, if you could be me for just one hour
If we could find a way to get inside each other's mind, uh huh
If you could see you through my eyes instead of your ego
I believe you'd be, I believe you'd be surprised to see
