- 1. The General Fund shows a net loss as of the end of February, 2024 of (-\$1,463.90.) The church was closed on Sunday, February 4, 2024 due to illness in the congregation, and could be part of the reason for the net loss.
- 2. Missions income as at the 29th of February totalled \$834.34. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. This amount is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$150.00; CBOQ Youth \$400.00; CBM General Budget \$238.34; and CBM Sharing Way \$46.00.
- 3. The Communion fund had a net gain as of 163.58.

 There was a balance from previous years of \$1,412.33, giving a total of \$1,575.91 in the Communion Fund.
- 4. The Special Projects Fund has a balance of \$4,755.50 for future projects.

Thank you to all the Plains Family who continue to help this church on the corner of the Oak Plains remain a thriving community of believers, spreading God's word to all.

PASTOR'S PAGE

Lent. St. Patrick's Day. Spring. Easter. Daylight savings time. It's March 2024. A lot is happening this month. What do I choose to write about with all this happening?

Sometimes life is like that, isn't it? It throws all sorts of stuff at us at once. It makes it hard to decide which way to turn, what to do, and how to focus. It's times like these that I think we can take advice from Patrick, Apostle to Ireland. In a song called *The Lorica*, written by Gayle Salmon and sung by Steve Bell we find these words:

I bind unto myself today, The gift to call on the Trinity. The saving faith where I can say. Come three in one, oh one in three.

Be above me, as high as the noon day sun.
Be below me, the rock I set my feet upon.
Be beside me, the wind on my left and right.
Be behind me, oh encircle me with your truth and light.

The words are based on a writing called St. Patrick's Breastplate, attributed to the saint who lived in the 5th century.

Patrick as we now know him was born in Britain the son of a deacon and at age 16 he was kidnapped and taken to Ireland. The Baptist Encyclopedia says,

Patrick was wild and wicked until his sixteenth year, when he remembered the God of his fathers and repented him of his sins, and enlisted in the divine service. There is no ground for doubting but that he preached the gospel of repentance and faith in Ireland, and that his ministrations were attended by overwhelming success. There are accounts extant of a number of his baptisms, but they are all immersions.

It goes on to say, "We have strong reasons for regarding St. Patrick as a Baptist missionary, and beyond contradiction his baptism was immersion." Now, I know that officially Baptist's didn't come about until the reformation hundreds of years later but that is kind of cool.

I can't imagine his life was easy but I think the words of the song above tell us where he got his strength and courage to continue on. With his feet firmly grounded on the rock of salvation he was able to bring the good news to the Celts of Ireland. We often think of the legend of him driving the snakes from the island. I have heard it said that these weren't physical snakes but the pagan druidic priests and practices of his day. It's hard

to sort out the fact and fiction that surrounds Patrick's life, but I believe he was a true warrior for God and that he came to love the people who had snatched him from his homeland and desired that they know the God of hope and life.

I don't think any of us has been snatched and kidnapped from our homes but we sometime face a no less daunting task of living in a world that is frightening and uncertain. We too can bind ourselves to the triune God and he will surround us with all we need to carry out the mission he has set us too. The bridge to the song goes like this:

God's ear to hear me.
God's hand to guide me.
God's might to uphold me.
God's shield to hide me.
Against all powers deceiving.
Against my own unbelieving.
Whether near or far.

During Lent, and as we celebrate Easter may we recognize that God listens, guides, protects and sustains us now and always.

He gives strength to the faint and strengthens the powerless. Youths may become faint and weary, and young men stumble and fall, but those who trust in the Lord will renew their strength; they will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not become weary, they will walk and not faint.

Isaiah 40:29-31
