Solar Eclipse Impact:

Nature responds to the eclipse. depending on your location. For example:

Shadows may look different , any breeze may dissipate, birds may stop chirping . During a total solar eclipse, some animals may tend to act confused or prepare for sleep. A 10°–15° F drop in temperature is not unusual .

After a total solar eclipse, it takes about an hour before total day light is restored

Ladies Aid Meeting, March 12, 2024

The guest speaker was Jillian Johnson from the London Team of 'Days For Girls', an organization which makes and delivers menstruation kits for girls in poor countries. Jillian stated that she has helped to deliver these kits in Kenya, Haiti, Guyana, as well as other countries. Days for Girls International has reached more that 3 million girls in 26 different countries. The London branch alone has prepared and delivered almost 5800 kits. It costs approximately \$20.00 to make one kit. In many ways, Canada suffers from "period poverty" especially in the indigenous and homeless population. Jillian stated that it is good to see that feminine hygiene products are gradually being made available in schools, libraries and workplaces.

Solar Eclipse Information:

When the Sun is blocked by the Moon, onlookers experience darkness in the day and a drop in temperature of about 10°F to 15°F. Also visible on the ground just before and after totality will be shadow bands, thin moving wavy lines moving and undulating in parallel, according to NASA. They're a consequence of turbulence in Earth's atmosphere.

What to expect:

This largely depends on where you are located, however you can still expect to observe the following: Light quality – as more of the Sun gets eclipsed, you'll notice daylight starting to fade and shadows will become sharper.


Temperature change – while the Sun is hidden by the Moon, temperatures will fall by about 5 degrees Celsius depending on weather conditions at your viewing site.

Animal behaviour – you may notice changes in normal behaviours; are the birds singing? Onlookers will get cold and see 'shadow bands'

Celestial Spectacle: Witness the 2024 Total Solar Eclipse

Astronomers and sky gazers are bracing for the astronomic event of a lifetime.

Elgin County invites residents and visitors alike to witness the breathtaking total solar eclipse on **Monday 8 April 2024**—a rare celestial event where the Moon passes between the Earth and the Sun, creating a captivating spectacle. This will be the first total solar eclipse in Ontario since 1979, and the next one is not anticipated until 2099, making this event truly extraordinary. People



usually have to travel to the other side of the planet if they want to see a total solar eclipse, but this year you will have a chance to see it right here in Elgin County. Total solar eclipses are only visible within a narrow path. In order to witness the full eclipse, you must be located in this path of totality. Elgin county lies directly in this path, making it a prime viewing location.

To ensure a safe viewing experience, it is crucial to use approved solar glasses and filters for cameras and telescopes.

You should never look directly at the Sun. Without protective eyewear the Sun's radiation can be incredibly damaging. Remember, the weather and in particular the clouds, may define the quality of your experience. Don't miss this once-in-a-lifetime display of nature's wonders. 1. The General Fund shows a net loss as of the 31st of March, 2024 of (-3,067.54.) The church was closed on Sunday, February 4, 2024 due to illness in the congregation, and could be part of the reason for the net loss.

 Missions income as at the 31st of March, 2024 totalled \$1,298.01. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. This amount is made up as follows: CBOQ - General Budget - \$290.00; CBOQ Youth - \$600.00; CBM General Budget - \$352.01; and CBM Sharing Way - \$56.00. The Easter Offering to date for CBOQ Missions totals \$65.00.

- 3. The Communion fund had a net loss of (-\$305.21.) Funds left over from previous years of \$1,412.33 helps to cover that deficit and leaves a balance of \$1,107.12 in the Communion Fund.
- 4. The Special Projects Fund has a balance of \$6656.13 for future projects. A total of \$1,850.63 in memory of Pat Martyn has been received, as well as \$25.00 in memory of Jim Rewbotham and \$25.00 in memory of Jean Lammiman.

Thank you to all the Plains Family who continue to help this church on the corner of the Oak Plains remain a thriving community of believers, spreading God's word to all.


