

- 1. The General Fund shows a net <u>GAIN</u> as at the 31st of August, 2025 of \$1,207.38! Grass cutting is paid up until May 31, 2025.
- 2. Missions income up to the 31st of August, 2025 totalled \$2,774.36. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. The total is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$1,655.00; CBOQ Youth \$200.00; CBM \$749.36, and CBM, Sharing Way \$130.00, plus Crisis Response \$10.00.
- 3. The Communion fund had a gain of \$1,516.73 at the end of August, 2025. There are Communion funds left over from 2024 and previous years totalling \$2,409.68, leaving a balance in the Communion Fund of \$3,926.41
- 4. The Sunday school received donations of \$455.00 to date, and the balance will be forwarded to the Treasurer at the end of the third quarter.
- 5. A balance of \$6,269.75 remained in the Special Projects Fund from previous years, and \$65.00 has been donated in 2025, giving a balance in that fund of \$6,334.75. An amount of \$200.00 was donated in memory of Mark Wilson, \$100.00 in memory of Ed Somerville, and \$70.00 in memory of Pauline Duffy, giving a balance in the Special Projects Fund of \$6,704.75.

To date, \$498.93 was spent on an office chair, \$4,476.12 on the sound booth renovations, and \$622.61 for a laser printer for the pastor's office. $c_{\mu\nu}$

That leaves a balance of \$1,107.09 in the Special Projects Fund.

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19)

As September arrives, the air begins to change. The mornings carry a hint of crispness, fields are heavy with harvest, and the maples prepare to display their brilliant colours. This month always feels like a turning of the page. Children and teachers return to classrooms, families shift from summer holidays back into routines, and we re-gather after the slower pace of July and August.

Let us step into this new church season with open hands and hopeful hearts. May we be a community where God's love is known, where gratitude flows freely, and where creation and neighbour alike are cherished as gifts from our generous Creator.
