We ask that all other donations be clean and in working condition and not brought to the church before the morning of **Friday**, **November 21 at 9:30** when set-up takes place.


A NEW COMMITTEE NEEDS A NEW NAME

Highlights of the Congregational Meeting, October 25, 2025

Clerk Mary Crosby called the meeting to order at 11:45 A.M.

Pastor Rob Spicer opened the meeting with a devotional, and reading from Thessalonians, Chapter 3.

Wayne Dale, appointed by the Deacons, acted as Chairman.

The Agenda was approved, to include under Other Business a revision to the wording of the Traditional Land Acknowledgment, and three proposals from the Finance Committee.

The minutes of the meeting of May 25,2025 were approved.

Reports were presented:

The Clerk's Report presented by Mary Crosby indicated that average weekly attendance is 65, with 90 attending on Anniversary Sunday.

Dan Dale reported for the Cemetery Committee that Melsa Winger and Pauline Duffy were the only burials. He also reported that the Central Elgin ownership of the old cemetery has been clarified.

The Deacons have established a plan for notification in the event of inclement weather resulting in the cancellation of a Sunday service.

Margie Bell was thanked for her distribution of cards, flowers, gift cards, donations, etc. on behalf of the congregation, to suitable recipients within the church and community.

Pastor Rob Spicer reported on the activities of the Elgin Association of Baptist Churches.

Margie Bell presented the Ladies Aid Report, noting that the Christmas Bazaar will be held on Saturday, November 22, 2025.

The Social Committee Report was presented by Nancy Millman, indicating that the free will donations at the Anniversary lunch will be included with the donation to Christmas Care in November.

Charlie Rewbotham presented the Trustees Report, outlining the maintenance projects which have been completed in recent months.

Shirley Dale presented the Treasurer's Report and Sherry Graham presented the Finance Committee Report. The computers will be upgraded or replaced, using funds from the Future Projects Fund and Centre Street Baptist Church fund money and interest earned. Also Funds from Centre Street Baptist Church money will be used for a contribution to CBOQ General Budget and a contribution to Canada Red Cross Canadian Wildfire Relief Fund for persons across Canada who have lost their homes to wild fires. The Social Committee and the Ladies Aid will contribute to this donation as well.

Camping at Springwater has been booked for June 19-21, 2026, the 23rd year of camping there.

The wording of the Traditional Land Acknowledgment will be corrected to include "The McKee Treaty 1790 between Alexander McKee on behalf of the Crown and the principal villaage and War Chiefs of the Ottawa, Chippewa, Pottowatomy and Huron Indians."

Wording for the use of the Communion Funds will be put in writing, for future reference.

The date of the next meeting will be February 8, 2026 at 12:00 noon.

Pastor Rob Spicer closed the meeting with prayer.

The meeting adjourned at 1:30 P.M.

- 1. The General Fund shows a net loss of (-654.63) as of the 31st of October, 2025. Grass cutting is paid up until the 31st of August, 2025.
- 2. Missions income up to the 31st of October, 2025 totals \$4,703.70. That amount has been forwarded to CBOQ and CBM. The total is made up as follows: CBOQ General Budget \$3,310.00; CBOQ Youth \$200.00; CBM \$997.70, and CBM, Sharing Way \$186.00, plus Crisis Response \$10.00. An amount of \$1,000.00 has been used from the high interest savings Centre Street funds and sent to CBOQ.
- 3. The Communion fund had a gain of \$1,458.10 at the end of October, 2025. There are Communion funds left over from 2024 and previous years totalling \$2,409.68, leaving a balance in the Communion Fund of \$3,867.78.
- 4. The Sunday school received donations of \$635.00 to date, and the balance of \$70.00 will be given to the Treasurer of the Sunday School at the end of the fourth quarter.
- 5. A balance of \$6,269.75 remained in the Special Projects Fund from previous years.

 An amount of \$200.00 in memory of Mark Wilson, \$100.00 in memory of Ed Somerville, \$70.00 in memory of Pauline Duffy, and \$165.00 to that fund were donated in 2025, giving a total of \$6,804.75.

 To date, \$5,597.66 was spent from the Special Project Fund.

 That leaves a balance of \$1,207.09 in the Special Projects Fund.
- 6. It was approved at the Fall Business Meeting on October 26, 2025 to send \$2,000 to Canadian Red Cross Wildfire Relief to help families who lost their homes during the wildfires. The Ladies Aid and the Social Committee each donated \$500.00 to the cause, and \$1,000 was used from the high interest savings account Centre Street.

Remembering and Honouring

November is a month that invites us to remember. The bright colours of autumn begin to fade, and the fields have fallen quiet. The air grows cooler, and our days grow shorter. It's as though the land itself takes a deep breath and pauses — inviting us to do the same.

Each year, on **November 11**, Canadians pause to remember. We stop, for a moment of silence, to honour those who served and sacrificed in times of war and conflict. We remember the lives lost, the families forever changed, and the courage of those who stood for peace and freedom.

When we see the **poppy**, we remember not only the cost of war but also the hope of peace — a hope that continues to call us as followers of Christ. Jesus said, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). As His people, we are called not simply to remember the peace others fought for, but to live as peacemakers ourselves — in our homes, in our community, and in our world.

May this season of remembrance renew in us a spirit of gratitude, compassion, and peace. And may we, as a church family, continue to be a community where Christ's peace is both spoken and lived.
